

## **Small Business Profile**

Advocacy: the voice of small business in government

## South Carolina

Small businesses totaled 357,900 in South Carolina in 2009. They represent 97.1 percent of all employers and employ 48.6 percent of the private-sector workforce. Being such a large part of the state's economy, these businesses are central to South Carolina's health and well-being.

This profile uses the latest available data to illustrate the status of South Carolina's small businesses. (Note that a small business is defined as one with fewer than 500 employees.)

- South Carolina's economy struggled in 2010, with real gross state product decreasing 0.7 percent and private-sector employment decreasing 0.5 percent (Bureau of Economic Analysis, Bureau of Labor Statistics).
- Most of South Carolina's small businesses are very small as 77.8 percent of all businesses did not have employees and most employers have fewer than 20 employees.
- Small businesses employed 750,147 workers in 2009 (Table 1) with most of the employment coming from firms with 20-499 employees.
- While the employment situation in 2008-2009 was weak (Table 2), small businesses in South Carolina represented 86.9 percent of the net new private-sector jobs from 2005-2008.
- Self-employment in South Carolina declined over the last decade. Female self-employment fared the best compared with other demographic groups during the decade.\*
- Throughout 2010, the number of opening establishments was lower than closing establishments and the net employment change from this turnover was positive (Table 3).
