

## **Small Business Profile**

Advocacy: the voice of small business in government

## Oklahoma

Small businesses significantly impact Oklahoma's economy. They represent 97.2 percent of all employers and employ 54.3 percent of the private-sector labor force. Small businesses are crucial to the fiscal condition of the state and numbered 332,998 in 2010.

This profile uses the latest available data to illustrate the status of Oklahoma's small businesses. (Note that a small business is defined as one with fewer than 500 employees.)

- Oklahoma's economy was strong in 2011, with real gross state product increasing 5.0 percent and private-sector employment increasing 2.0 percent (Bureau of Economic Analysis, Bureau of Labor Statistics).
- Small businesses employed 673,373 workers in 2010 (Table 1) with most of the employment coming from firms with 20-499 employees.
- The employment situation from 2007-2010 was weak, yet small businesses in Oklahoma represented all of the net new jobs (Table 2). The unemployment rate in 2010-2011decreased by 0.7 percent.
- Most of Oklahoma's small businesses are very small as 78.5 percent of all businesses have no employees, and most employers have fewer than 20 employees.
- In 2011, the number of opening establishments was lower than closing establishments, and the net employment change from this turnover was negative (Table 3).
- Self-employment in Oklahoma declined over the last decade. Minority self-employment fared the best compared with other demographic groups.
