Topics Summary

- 1. OSHA's Planned SBREFA Panel on Emergency Response (ER) How Will It Impact Small Entities? On January 7, 2019, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration notified the Office of Advocacy and the Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs (OIRA) within OMB that it is planning to convene a Small Business Advocacy Review (SBAR) panel (also known as a SBREFA panel) on Emergency Response (ER) under the Small Business Regulatory Enforcement Fairness Act (SBREFA) rule in the next sixty days. OSHA's possible rulemaking would replace OSHA's existing Fire Brigade standard at 29 CFR 1910.156 with a new comprehensive standard for entities that perform emergency response activities and are not covered by an existing OSHA standard (e.g., PSM, HAZWOPR, Confined Spaces, etc.). However, if these entities perform emergency response activities beyond that standard, they could be brought under the new comprehensive standard as well. While OSHA currently regulates some aspects of emergency response and preparedness, some of its standards were promulgated decades ago and were not designed as comprehensive emergency response standards. In 2016, OSHA's NACOSH Subcommittee on Emergency Response and Preparedness issued a report and draft regulatory text that could lead to new regulations on emergency responders, fire departments, and private sector entities that respond to an emergency incident scene or a disaster site. Andrew Levinson, the Deputy Director of OSHA's Directorate of Standards and Guidance, will discuss the status of this rulemaking and the upcoming SBAR/SBREFA panel.
- II. An Update from the House Subcommittee on Workforce Protections and Pending Legislation on "Workplace Violence Prevention for Health Care and Social Service Workers." The Workplace Protections subcommittee is part of the House Education and Workforce Committee. The subcommittee recently held a hearing entitled "Caring for Our Caregivers: Protecting Health Care and Social Service Workers from Workplace Violence" that concerned pending legislation called the "Workplace Violence Prevention for Health Care and Social Service Workers Act." This legislation would compel OSHA to issue an interim final rule on workplace violence and then engage in a broader rulemaking process on the subject. Jordan Barab, the Senior Counsel to the House Subcommittee on Workplace Protections (and former Deputy Assistant Secretary for OSHA) will provide an update about the subcommittee, it's priorities for the coming term, and its recent hearing and the pending legislation a topic that is scheduled on OSHA's regulatory agenda to be the subject of an upcoming SBREFA panel.
- III. A Recap of the ABA's OSH Law Section Meeting: Key Issues for Small Business. The American Bar Association's annual Occupational Safety and Health Law Section meeting was recently held and there were a number of issues raised of interest to small businesses on both the OSHA and MSHA fronts. These included litigation, rulemaking initiatives, regulatory reform, and enforcement. Eric J. Conn, a founding partner and Chair of the OSHA Workplace Safety Group at Conn Maciel Carey LLP, who attended the conference and participated in the program, will provide a recap of the meeting and address significant issues that may impact small business. Mr. Conn, is an attorney who advises and represents employers, including numerous small businesses, on occupational safety and health matters.
